Semester overview

This course will provide students with the necessary tools for building web pages through the use of basic HTML code and Cascading Style Sheets (CSS). Focus will also be placed on utilizing design elements and principles to emphasize the importance of web as an aesthetic form of communication.

Required course texts:

- HTML, XHTML & CSS (Sixth Edition) by Elizabeth Castro.
- Additional resources and reading materials will be accessible via Moodle.

Recommended texts:

- designing web graphics. 4 by Lynda Weinman
- Dreamweaver CS4: The Missing Manual by David Sawyer McFarland

Grading

Individual grades are based on a variety of criteria including class participation, exams, quizzes and meeting project deadlines. Final grades will be determined based on the following components:

- 5% General preparedness
- 10% Class participation
- 10% Lab assignments and class exercises
- 25% Tests and guizzes
- 50% Major projects (four)

In addition, independent investigation of on-line tutorials may be assigned to supplement in-class instruction and facilitate understanding of the material.

Sketchbooks/journals

Students are encouraged to maintain sketchbooks or journals to help document process development. The books can include drawings, notes, inspiration or any other resources that aid in creative development, according to personal preference.

Materials

Students might occasionally need general art supplies, such as pencils, markers, X-acto knives and drawing paper, and are encouraged to split resources with one another whenever possible.

Moodle

Moodle will be used for assignments and class communications. Consequently, it will be your responsibility to check the site regularly for information and updates, and to make sure that your "goshen.edu" e-mail account is set up to forward e-mail if you use another e-mail service.

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Attendance

Attendance is mandatory. This course, which is a collaborative effort on the part of both the instructor and students, involves discussions, critiques and exercises that require class participation. Consequently, unexcused absences and continually arriving late and leaving early will negatively affect a student's final grade at the end of the semester.

Illness, family emergencies or pre-approved activities related to another class, such as class trips, are considered excused absences and will not impact a student's grade. (Please notify me ahead of time if you will be missing class.)

Late assignments

Assignments are due at the beginning of class on their specified due dates. Any work turned in ten minutes after class has started is considered late and will be lowered one letter grade.

In addition to four major projects, students will be given smaller, supplementary exercises and assignments throughout the semester. (Refer to the "Semester schedule" handout for additional details.)

Week 02-04 **Project 1: Information Architecture and Organization** Objective: To help students organize body copy into a basic page layout in Dreamweaver, and consider how hierarchy plays a role in effectively grouping and placing content.

Week 04-07 Project 2: Organizing Ideas into a Website

Objective: To help students develop their own web content; to help students utilize their knowledge of HTML and CSS to highlight an event or activity in a way that communicates a clear narrative.

Week 07-10 Project 3: Creative Brief and Sketches (for final website project)

Objective: To help students utilize their research and communication skills; to help students utilize their knowledge of HTML, CSS and design elements and principles to develop working concepts for a final website design.

Week 07-11 **Project 4: Tolerance and the Other (collaborative)**

Objective: To help students utilize their knowledge of web design components in the development of an interactive narrative rooted in a specific theme; to help students work collaboratively; to help students capitalize on the unique aspects of web (as a communication tool).

Week 10-15 **Project 5: Final Website**

Objective: To help students utilize their knowledge of HTML, CSS and design elements and principles to execute the design of a fully functional website.
